Long lived winter flowering perennials that will grow to approximately 45cm tall by 45 cm in width. Loved for their showy double, semi-double and single winter flowers and handsome glossy divided leaves. Their foliage is evergreen and the main flowering period is from June to September. Ideal for under and around deciduous trees and shrubs.

Prefers a semi-shaded to full sun position. Best in well-drained fertile garden soil that has had organic matter added. Remove old foliage and fertilise in Autumn. Mulch in Spring. Spent flowers can be removed prior to seed dropping in mid-Spring if you don't want lots of seedlings popping up the following Winter. Caution - harmful if eaten / skin irritant.

**Plant Care:**

Annual slow release fertiliser, Keep moist during dry periods, Liquid feed, Mulch well
